

## PRESIDENT'S JOURNAL

## For this summer edition of our newsletter, here are some updates

**New England District Convention** – Pastor and I attended the triennial convention in June. There's nothing like the sound of a sanctuary of pastors singing our liturgy and hymns! But there was also business to attend to. Rev. Robert Beinke of St. Peter-Norwalk was elected NED President; he had been Acting President following the passing of our beloved President Yeadon who was called home earlier this year. Rev. Robert Morris of Newtown was elected Circuit Visitor for our Circuit (a "local" group of congregations).

One of the other joys of the NED Convention is the marking of milestones of pastors and rostered workers. Holy Cross was well represented in this area. Rev. Ronald Froehlich and Rev. Steven Bartell (a "son" of Holy Cross) were recognized for 66 and 38 years of faithful ministry respectively. And both Rev. Bill (Ordained) and Christine (Commissioned) Flammann were recognized with Emeritus status.

Back at home we have had a few changes to our own **Board of Directors**. I am very happy to announce that Jon Halls has been appointed Financial Secretary. We thank him for stepping up to fill this important role. Meanwhile, Vice Presi-

dent Sherry Duff and Worship Commission Director Lydia Struzik have stepped down from their positions to focus on their job responsibilities. We thank them for their many years of leadership and service to Holy Cross, especially during our vacancy. Because we will be updating our Bylaws to be more reflective of today's volunteerism (subject to congregational approval), we will not be seeking immediate replacements.

Then there is **our facility**. Pastor Erb has been effective in helping us see our building with fresh eyes, like those of a first-time visitor. This is an important perspective if we want to be seen as a welcoming congregation. You may have noticed that the nar-



thex seems less cluttered and more open, while the new TV allows for timely recognitions and announcements. In the sanctuary you may need shades because of the light streaming in through the new skylights (thanks, Dan!)

And there's more to come. Our restrooms need updating and our undercroft (lower level) is currently not being used because, quite frankly, it smells and looks terrible – except for the great murals. Updating will require going beyond cosmetic work and challenge us to deep clean/declutter and strategically plan while meeting both local and federal requirements, like ADA. How can you help? Be thinking about realistic use of our space – how would it look? How do we get there? If you are asked to help with a specific task, I hope you will agree. Finally, I hope that everyone will prayerfully consider how you can help financially support the work we have ahead of us.

In our post-pandemic world we often speak of returning to normal. I respectfully disagree. It's time for us to envision a better normal, one in which Holy Cross is buzzing with activity and an active membership. We must trust in the Lord as we step into the future. I pray you will step with me!

## **COVENANT TO CARE FOR CHILD**REN

## The back-to-school project kicks off early this summer with donations due on August 7

Summer break from school only began a couple weeks ago, but we already need to focus on the new backpacks and school supplies children will need for the 2022-23 school year. Through our covenant with the State of Connecticut's Covenant to Care for Children program and Holy Cross' "adopted" DCF social worker, Mimose Ulysses-Laurenard, we



have a promise to fulfill: Providing the 31 school-aged children in Mimose's caseload with a new backpack filled with necessary and fun school supplies. Mimose has had an exceptionally-challenging late spring with so many new children assigned to her caseload; typically we provide 24-26 filled backpacks, but this year Holy Cross members and friends will be challenged to provide 31.

Beginning July 3, look in the narthex for the large display board with pockets filled with 3"-by-5" "shopping cards" for school supply items. Each card lists the specific item needed...backpacks, pens, colored pencils, pencil pouches, binders, pencils, pocket folders, markers, and so much

more. The display board will remain in the narthex through the due date – August 7 – so watch for store sales throughout July. If you wish to make a donation of a backpack and/or school supplies, just take the appropriate "shopping cards" from the poster and return your donation(s) no later than August 7.

If you are not able to shop, monetary donations for this project are welcomed. You may make a check out to Holy Cross Lutheran, and write "Cov to Care" in the memo section. Monetary donations may be put in the Covenant to Care mailbox (bottom row, far right) or mailed to the church office, and must be received by July 24 so that I can take inventory of items still needed.

Thank you in advance for your generosity to help our church's adopted social worker as she works with children of all ages who are unfortunately removed from their home and placed into the DCF system.

## LEARN FROM & BE INSPIRED BY SCRIPTURE

The Holy Cross Word monthly "Bible study on paper": Acts, Chapter 15

Acts, Chapter 15, 41 verses—In this section of Acts in which the spread of the Christian church is shown expanding overseas and to "the ends of the earth," Chapter 15 focuses on a meeting at Jerusalem.



Please pause now to read the full Chapter 15 of Acts (use a home Bible or an aid such as BibleGateway.com if needed).

#### Chapter 15 analysis—

Chapters 13 and 14 had described a few examples of the typical circumstances surrounding Paul and Barnabas' missionary journeys. A "usual" pattern was arriving and being well received at first following their Good News messages about Jesus and their desire to share what His earthly ministry fulfilled. Both Jews and Gentiles were becoming believers. But then the Jews who were angered by what the missionaries preached caused disturbances and riled up those who would do harm to the two, whereupon they would leave for another city.

The missionary journey in Chapter 14 carried on through Pisidia, Pamphylia, Perga, Attalia, Antioch, back where they had started and where the missionaries were commended for their work; they stayed in Antioch "for some time."

Chapter 15 begins with a description of a conference in Jerusalem or "The Council at Jerusalem." "Certain individuals" from Jerusalem came to Antioch and warned the Christians that they had to obey every law and custom from Moses or they could not be saved. This, of course, was quite disturbing to hear, particularly to the Gentile Christians, and after Paul and Barnabas had involved themselves in debate about this they led a group to Jerusalem to have a meeting with the apostles and elders. Paul and Barnabas told the men from Jerusalem they were wrong. Gentiles are saved without keeping Moses' law. But the two were worried this new edict would turn the Gentiles

away from their message. Because God had given certain rules to Moses for the Jews/Israelites, the Gentiles had never had to abide by them and didn't even know the teachings.

On the way to Jerusalem, the group delivered their message of hope successfully in Phoenicia and Samaria. There was great rejoicing at those stops. After their initial arrival in Jerusalem, the group gave a report on all they had been doing, but a certain sect of Pharisees still firmly believed the law of Moses had to be strictly obeyed to the final letter. Their thinking lacked the understanding that Jesus had taught believers to live holy lives and that they could do so even though they didn't know anything about the law of Moses.



In verse 7 we read that a great amount of debate took place, after which Peter spoke forcefully, feeling he had been appointed by God to be a leader. He reviewed his previous speeches that focused on how the Gentiles were not any different in God's eyes than the Jews and there was no need to put divisions between them. One of his main points was that God gave the Holy Spirit to Jew and Gentile, and he pointed out "we believe that we will be saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus, just as they will." This seemed to silence the assembly, and Barnabas and Paul took that chance to restate all the "signs and wonders that God had done through them among the Gentiles."

When they had finished, James, who had been the church leader in Jerusalem, supported his brothers and contributed to the argument to be more understanding by basically telling those assembled, "We should not trouble the Gentile believers to do things the same way we do them. Instead, we should

warn them to keep away from idols and sin." He quoted from Amos: "After this I will return, and I will rebuild the dwelling of David, which has fallen; from its ruins I will rebuild it, and I will set it up, so that all other peoples may seek the Lord—even all the gentiles over whom my name has been called. Thus says the Lord, who has been making these things known from long ago." His final point, in verses 19 and 20, was that instead of limiting and causing doubt among the Gentiles, they should be building them up and encouraging them to live sinless lives "to abstain only from things polluted by idols and from sexual immorality and from whatever has been strangled and from blood."

The joint arguments ending with James bound everyone together in agreement. The church in Jerusalem wrote a letter to the church in Antioch (and Syria and Cilicia, too), which Paul and Barnabas delivered, in the company of two other preachers who the church chose: Judas called Barsabbas and Silas, two leading men in the community. (With the writing of the letter, the first ecumenical church council ever held ended.) The contents of the letter is contained in verses 23-29. The letter was well received in Antioch and there was rejoicing that the Gentiles would not have to live like the Jews to please God. The Antioch believers remained strong in their worship of God. Judas and Silas were of great help in encouraging the believers. Judas would return to Jerusalem after many days but there is evidence that Silas stayed in Antioch.

Paul and Barnabas remained in Antioch, continuing to teach and proclaim about Jesus. But the two would have a disagreement. Paul wanted to retrace their previous steps to see how the believers they had left behind were doing. That was fine with Barnabas but he wanted to take his nephew John Mark; but because the nephew had not been on all of these stops, Paul preferred to not have him along. With this clear disagreement, Barnabas left for Cyprus with John Mark. It was a peaceful resolution and a great example of solving issues calmly and with purpose because later Paul and John Mark would work together again. Paul selected Silas to go with him on his second missionary journey through Syria and Cilicia (Asia Minor).
