HEAD TO THE HEART

Drawn to the Cross

A calendar is so much more than an organizational tool. I would propose that in addition to marking the passage of time, a calendar actually affects what you do in the present, which in turn shapes the future. Don't believe me? Check this out...

My youngest brother is getting married in May. I have marked this day on my calendar. It doesn't take place for a few months, and yet it has begun to affect me now. I've gone to get an initial fitting for my tuxedo, which in turn has alerted me to the fact that I've gained a few pounds, which in turn causes me to exercise, which in turn benefits my current health, which in turn might prolong my days in the future. If you take a look at any date you have on your calendar, and about all aspects of this one date, you could see how multiple branches stem from this solitary event.

It works in reverse as well. We are just beginning the Lenten Season in the church. A period of time we set aside, to focus on the death and resurrection of Jesus. Most scholars believe that Jesus died on the cross on April 3, AD33 at 3 p.m. This solitary event took place nearly 2,000 years ago and yet it has a real and profound impact on you today; on the way you think, believe, act, and interact with those around you.

In addition, this date on the calendar has an effect on how we orient our days. In fact, pretty much the entire world is affected by this date because Easter follows Good Friday. Whether one celebrates Easter as the resurrection of Christ or just a day to eat lots of candy, this date is not neutral. Stores will sell decorations, cards, and candy. Restaurants will offer special brunches and parties. Schools will take a break, and families will plan vacations all on account of this calendar date.

Now, I say all of that to say – How will you be formed by the cross this Lenten Season?

I encourage you to let the cross and the season of Lent form and shape your days. Taking time to think about the cross, and what it means for you, will have a tremendous impact – not only on your eternity but also on your day-to-day experiences. I encourage you to put Wednesdays in Lent on your calendar – and orient your week around them – so that you may come each week and be reminded of the Love Christ has for you, and be renewed in your relationship with God, and refreshed in your faith.

Throughout Lent we will be "Drawn to the Cross" where we find our Savior. The One who gave His life for us, and who in turn calls us to give our lives in service to others, in the hope that they, too, will find their salvation in Him.



EVANGELISM AND YOU

Monthly director's report on things to know and even things to do

Having made the suggestion in the February newsletter to feel a sense of urgency to meet a goal of being involved in one extra thing this year for your church that you haven't done before, this month I want to explore with you the skills we Christians need to be evangelists. After all, Jesus instructed us to evangelize and tell "everyone what He has done." But many of us are shy when it comes to speaking of our Christianity, myself included, and we often need en-

couragement to get words out. So for that reason I like what the verse says in the hymn, "Hark! The Voice of Jesus Crying," that "If you cannot preach like Paul, you can tell the love of Jesus; you can say He died for all. If you cannot rouse the wicked with the Judgment's dread alarms, you can lead the little children to the Savior's waiting arms."

So that's the encouragement for this month. I firmly believe that in those moments when we have opportunity to give witness to being a Christian that the Holy Spirit helps us know what to say. I am an awful off-the-cuff speaker who has always been shy in public but when called upon I feel I get by in witnessing to Christ. Most of us are not called into ministry or to be teachers of the Word, but we are part of the priesthood of believers and that alone is good enough to be an evangelist because the Holy Spirit is with us. Evangelists are also



faithful: in devotion to God and to their fellow man as they seek to convince non-Christians to follow God and current believers to nourish and grow their faith. And both objectives can be achieved through the courage of letting the Spirit move you to know what to say and speak it. (See the review of Acts, Chapter 11, on page 7, to see further evidence from the early Christian church on how "ordinary" men can be evangelistic types.)

As for the commission's key tasks, they are all in motion. Elisabeth Erb has now done a third display case theme, the most recent a love theme for February. She intends to follow that with a Lenten one in March. My thanks to her and the other commission members Doris Bernt, DJ Broadbin, and Tina Curto. We're also presently working with Pastor Erb on updating the Holy Cross info card and shaping a letter to new homeowners in the area.

Lastly, this month's featured tracts in the narthex are: Look for tracts that help you understand the married life and how to make it work.

COVENANT TO CARE FOR CHILDREN

Easter Basket project to begin March 13 with baskets due on April 3

Even before Valentine's Day there was Easter candy on display in some grocery stores! And at that time I began to think it would soon be time to present the Covenant to Care for Children Easter Basket project to the congregation. And that time is quickly approaching. On Sunday, March 13, please look for the large basket poster that will be on display in the narthex. It will be filled with bunny, chick and butterfly tags, each listing a child's first name,

gender and age. These tags represent the children in the caseload of our "adopted" DCF social worker, Mimose Laurenard. If you wish to participate, select a tag from the poster and put together a basket.



What should the basket contain and how much should you spend? Please stick to a price limit of about \$30. You may certainly include some Easter candy, but please, not too much. Small age-appropriate toys and personal items are ideal, as are crayons, markers, journals, small stuffed animals, and bath and body products. All baskets must be covered with a cellophane wrap and are due no later than Sunday, April 3. That will give Mimose a

couple weeks to deliver the baskets prior to Easter.

If you are reading this article and know you will not be at worship on March 13 and would like to participate by putting together a basket, please contact me via my personal e-mail address (schrocknroll@optonline.net) and I can match you with a child.

I also wanted to share with you that Mimose has had a stressful past month. On top of having a heavy workload with an above normal caseload size of 29 children, she is dealing with two "terminate parental rights" cases that take so much of her time away from working with the other children. Also, in late January, Mimose's father was suddenly called home to the Lord after a brief illness. Please keep Mimose in your prayers.

Thank you in advance for your willingness to help young people in our community who are in crisis and need. I look forward to leading this project that will bring children God's love through something as simple as an Easter basket.

LEARN FROM & BE INSPIRED BY SCRIPTURE

The Holy Cross Word monthly "Bible study on paper": Acts, Chapter 11

Acts, Chapter 11, 30 verses—This chapter continues to look at how persecution of the church caused it to scatter and spread. Chapters 9 to 12 focus on how the church now includes Gentiles. Please pause now to read the full Chapter 11 of Acts (use an aid such as BibleGateway.com if needed).

Chapter 11 analysis—

Chapter 10 had focused on Peter's ministry, including the conversion of Cornelius, Peter's vision, and his visit to Cornelius' home. Chapter 11 opens with the apostles and believers learning that Gentiles were also accepting the word of God, believing in Jesus and being baptized. In Jerusalem, Peter was being criticized about this by the circumcised leaders about the uncircumcised becoming believers. That issue had not yet been discussed through an ecumenical council. The early church was being hampered by excessive adherence to law or formula.

But Peter defended how Gentiles were being evangelized to and primarily did so by explaining recent events, including the conversion of Cornelius. He maintained that the way the Holy Spirit had come upon Cornelius' household confirmed in his mind that the Gospel was for both Jew and Gentile, the circumcised and uncircumcised. Peter uses Jesus' own words during his defense, which he must have done well because in the end his detractors were quieted. They praised God and said, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."



The rest of 11 returns to explain about the persecuted who were scattered after the stoning of Stephen. Many

believers had fled to other cities and countries when Jerusalem became too dangerous. They had gone to Phoenicia, Cyprus and Antioch and had spoken only to Jews. These deliverers of the good news were just "ordinary" believers, not ministerial types. Believers today can take heart that the spreading of God's salvation plan for mankind can be done by any status of Christian, not just ordained ministers.

The Jerusalem church sent Barnabas to Syria to look into the Antioch situation, sort of a check and balance situation to get a first-hand look at what had been reported. When he saw the grace of God in full vigor, Barnabas was quite pleased and rejoiced and he himself urged those in Antioch to remain faithful.

Barnabas thought it well to travel to Tarsus and bring Saul back to Antioch, and for a year the two ministered to great crowds there, and we are told that is where believers were first called Christians. The Antioch townsfolk observed that the believers behaved differently than nonbelievers. It is the first reference in the New Testament (NT) to Christians, although in the Harper's Study Bible is says in Antioch it may have been used as a slur.

In verse 27 we get the first NT reference to Christian prophets, although, of course, John the Baptist and Jesus were prophets. Agabus travels from Jerusalem to Antioch and delivers the troubling prophesy that there will be a famine all over the world, which there was during the time of Claudius' reign. (We will hear more from Agabus in chapter 21.) Relief to Judea did come but it was limited to the Christian community.

In Chapter 12, Herod's persecution of the church will be analyzed.


